Rating Wireman Francis Alan Shore

After our November cover picture of the headstone of Rating Wireman Francis Alan **Shore** of Littleton Panell, Anne Wilson kindly sent us this biography of Alan Shore, taken from Lyn Dyson's book 'Lest We Forget'.

18th birthday to serve in the Royal Navy and became a wireman on HMS Albatross. A Rating Wireman was usually someone who had some skills as an electrician in civilian life, either wiring buildings or motor vehicles. They were mainly employed in small ships.



HMS Albatross

on 15th May 1925, the son of Fred and Rosa Shore. Alan was the baby of the family, his brother and two sisters being at least 15 years older. When he left school he apprenticed isn't clear whether this was the result of as an electrician to Chivers, a Devizes firm. He was a keen sportsman and cyclist and He was just 19. travelled to work each day on his bicycle. He was also a talented musician and sang particularly well.

Alan was called up in 1943 shortly after his

At the beginning of June HMS Albatross 1944, sailed from Portsmouth via the Thames Estuary and headed towards Beach, arriving Sword on 10th lune.The ship provided naval gunfire support and supplemented

Francis Alan Shore, known as Alan, was born the anti-aircraft defence. On 13th June, whilst preparing a ship called the Java for sinking. Alan was struck in the chest by a shell and died almost instantly. It an enemy attack or an accident on board.

> HMS Albatross was hit by a torpedo on 11th August with the loss of 66 lives. However, the ship survived the war and eventually evolved into the 'Hellenic Prince'.



Think Horse! Don't block Bridleway access with your car

News and Views has had a request from a local horse owner to raise the issue of parked cars blocking the gates to bridleways. In particular, she asks walkers who park their vehicles at the bottom of the hill near the Strawberry Hill Reservoir site (Grid reference SU995530) not to park their cars by the gate leading up to the bridleway, and to leave the access to the bridleway gate clear so that horses can get through.

They cannot squeeze in between vehicles to get to the gate, and as there is no other access either going up to or coming down the hill, blocking this bridleway is blocking a Right of Way. Why not add a little extra to your walk and park on the hard standing by the Westbury Road and walk down the track to the hill?

Making an Eco-Friendly Christmas Wreath from Your Garden

In December, none of us feel like being in the garden - hopefully all your tender plants are tucked up warm and cosy and your beds have a nice, thick layer of mulch. If so, I thought I would give you a nice project to do, using cuttings from your garden by creating an eco-friendly Christmas wreath. By using materials from your garden, you can make a beautiful, sustainable decoration with a personal touch.

Gather Your Materials

Start by collecting evergreen branches such as holly or pine for the base - you'll need more than you think. Look for natural embellishments like pinecones, berries, seed pods, dried flowers or even feathers. For a splash of colour, include sprigs of rosemary, lavender, or eucalyptus if you have them.

Build the Frame

You can create a base by bending flexible branches, like willow or dogwood, into a circle and securing them with twine. Alternatively, reuse an old wreath frame if you have one. To keep your wreath eco-friendly, avoid foam or plastic bases.

Assemble the Wreath

Layer the greenery around the frame, securing each piece with natural twine or biodegradable floral wire. Overlap the stems to create a full, lush effect. Add your decorative elements, like berries and pinecones, ensuring they are evenly spaced for balance. Think about doing things in threes.

Add the Finishing Touch

For hanging, use a ribbon made of natural fibre or repurpose strips of fabric. Avoid synthetic ribbons or glittery decorations. This handmade wreath not only celebrates the beauty of nature but also fosters sustainability. Plus, it can be composted after the festive season, leaving no waste behind. Happy crafting!

The dramatic sea cliffs, crags and stacks of Rathlin Island, County Antrim, rise more than 200 metres above the Atlantic Ocean and host one of the UK's largest seabird colonies, including hundreds of puffins. From September, when the puffins left to spend the winter at sea, skilled teams started culling the Island's predators, as the final phase of a project to protect puffins, whose numbers declined by 74% between 1991 and 2021. This initiative is a Life Raft Project led by a partnership with RSPB Northern Ireland and the local community. In the first phase ferrets were targeted and none has been seen for a year. The traps are baited but scientifically designed to keep out non-targeted species.

A recent Kew Gardens report concluded that a third of the world's tree species could be wiped out due to climate change and other environmental negatives, including species such as the whitebeam, spindle, hawthorn, and in Scotland, the aspen. Trees are essential for wildlife. Spring blossom provides nectar for pollinators and the leaves are a food source for a range of insects, including caterpillars, leafhoppers and beetles. The berries attract a range of bird species for food in the autumn and winter including migrants, mainly from Scandinavia. Although you are unlikely to spot a Scarlet Tanager on your washing line like the one recently seen in a Yorkshire garden. This bird is a resident of the eastern seaboard of America, weighing approximately 30 grams and blown off course in the recent gales.

Bird Life International is a worldwide conservation organisation concerned in preventing species decline and extinction. If you log onto their website at **birdlife.org**, it is quite shocking to learn how many world species are on Red Lists, due not only to changing climate patterns but also to over-population and loss of habitat through over development and predation. Data analysis shows that the threats affecting the greatest number of the world's threatened bird species are (in descending order) agriculture (73% of species), logging (51%), invasive alien species (42%), hunting and trapping (39%), and climate change (37%).

The recent extreme flooding in many areas of the populated continents and the decline of sea ice in both polar regions are causing alarm worldwide. The recent COP 29 (Conference of the Parties) has been described in the press as 'not fit for purpose', and the fact that it was held in Baku, Azerbaijan where oil and gas exploration started, was a strange choice. COP 30, to be held in Brazil, will hopefully be more constructive, especially as the rain forests (the Lungs of the World) are getting near to tipping points due to deforestation, mining developments and increasing human populations.

Remember that December 21st is 'Robin Day' for our national bird, so put out some Christmas treats for them. Let us all make New Year Resolutions to improve our environment and to discover Nature again for our children in 2025.

One of the best presents you can give or receive at Christmas is a book and I find choosing the right book for each person is a real pleasure. Here are a few which might help you with your Christmas shopping.

For Children

For the youngest children, the magic of Christmas is brought to life in **The Jolly Christmas Postman**, an endearing classic by *Janet and Allan Ahlberg*. Every page brings a surprise to open and the familiarity of the nursery rhyme characters will delight every child.

For a young reader with a sense of humour, **Father Christmas** *by Raymond Briggs* is a must. Children will delight in the everyday problems he faces on his quest to deliver parcels all over the world. And for readers aged 8+ **A Boy called Christmas** *by Matt Haig* is a glorious mix of fairytale, folklore and fun and the 'true' story of Father Christmas.

For Harassed Cooks

Once the lunch is over and the house is full of food, the cook deserves some peace and time to browse something not too serious. To dip into *Jeanette Winterson's* Christmas Days – 12 Stories and 12 Feasts for 12 Days will be a real treat. Stories, festive recipes and quite a lot of magic.

For anyone who wants to get lost in a winter story, try **The Bear and the Nightingale** *by Katharine Arden.* At the edge of the Russian wilderness, Vasilisa spends the winter nights huddled around the embers of a fire with her beloved siblings, listening to her nurse's fairy tales. Above all, she loves the chilling story of Frost, the blue-eyed winter demon, who appears in the frigid night to claim unwary souls – a magical novel.

Best read aloud, is **The Twelve Days of Christmas** *by John Julius Norwich*, a delightful little book recording the daily correspondence from a bemused young lady to her unseen admirer whose increasingly unwelcome gifts cause mayhem in an English country Christmas. Perfectly illustrated by *Quentin Blake*.

On a darker note, **The Anomaly** *by Herve le Tellier*, is a gripping thriller. During a terrifying storm, Air France flight oo6 inexplicably duplicates. For every passenger, there are now two: a double with the same mind, body and memories. Only one thing sets them apart, while one plane lands in March, the other doesn't arrive until June. Nothing can explain this unprecedented event. But for each duplicated passenger, an impossible moment of reckoning awaits. If there are two of you, and just one life ... who gets to live it?

And bringing a very traditional tale up to date, **Mrs Scrooge** by former Poet Laureate **Carol Ann Duffy** is a delight. With her husband, Ebenezer, now 'doornail dead', the coldest Christmas Eve on record finds Mrs. Scrooge outside the supermarket protesting against consumerism and waste. That night, alone in her bed with Catchit the cat, Mrs. Scrooge is visited by the Ghosts and she too learns what Christmas really means.

recycling our food waste like some other authorities in the UK. In short, when the Environment Act was updated in 2021 with a sorting ineffective and too expensive (£1.8m requirement for councils to collect food waste and flexible plastics (film lids and cellophane), we were midway through a recycling contract and were granted an extension until the end of 2026 when the contracts end.

We are approaching the early stages of procurement for new contracts and so those of you who are keen to be recycling more will be pleased to hear that we will be building food waste collections and flexible plastic recycling into our recycling programme from 2027 onwards.

Incorporating food waste and flexible plastics is something we have no choice to do, as it is mandated by central government. However, building it into our current operation is likely to cost an additional £2.4m every year! Wiltshire Council's Waste and Recycling Team was therefore tasked with looking at opportunities to accommodate Government policy, improve recycling rates and reduce costs for residents. This led to the testing of various alternative options for recycling from 2027 onwards.

Some local authorities force residents to separate every type of material into different stackable boxes or bags, but our research showed the participation rate is lower because it is too onerous. In fact Basildon has just given up with their 6-container recycling method and is scrapping the whole idea. At the New Year!

Many residents have asked me why we aren't opposite end of the scale, some councils have experimented with a single bin for all recycling, including glass, but found the mechanical extra cost per year).

> The solution approved by Wiltshire's Cabinet on 19th November is the right balance for the environment, budget and residents. From 2027 we will introduce one extra wheeled bin in order to separate paper and card from the current process. 10% of households already have this extra recycling bin, so they will see no change other than to use one for paper and card and the other for plastic and cans. For anyone lacking space for a wheeled bin, an alternative weighted sack will be available.

> This will significantly lower the recycling reject rate (the amount of recyclable waste that doesn't make it through the process due to contamination) from 22.5% to just 4.9% and will save local taxpavers £750,000 every single year. The significance of saving £750k versus having to spend an extra £2.4m is massive. This money can be reinvested into our communities through additional road maintenance, town centre development, education or adult social care.

> The key message is that there is no change to bin collections or recycling procedure for another few years - for now it is business as usual!

Places of Safety: In case of evacuation or if you need temporary shelter, one of our designated Places of Safety will be activated: West Lavington Village Hall (our primary location), All Saints Church, Ebenezer Baptist Church, or St Joseph's Catholic Church. These locations can provide warmth, shelter, and basic amenities for up to 36 hours.

Local Skills and Resources: The Parish Council maintains a list of local individuals with skills that can assist during emergencies.

What to do if you require community support. If there is an immediate risk to life or property, call 999. For non-life-threatening situations covered by the Emergency Plan, contact a member of the Parish Council. They can help coordinate local resources and volunteers to assist you.

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WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council of West Lavington

Richard Gamble stood down from the Parish Council in November after many years serving the village as both a Parish Councillor and the previous Wiltshire Councillor for the Lavingtons. Richard has an in-depth knowledge of the village and his experience and wisdom will be sorely missed. We would like to thank him for his service.

We had existing vacancies on the Council, so together with Richard's departure we were able to co-opt three new Councillors at our November meeting. We welcome Michael Sworder, Sandy Pattison and Andrew Koval-Radley. We now have a full complement of members.

Last month we were joined by our new MP Brian Mathew, who gave his time to visit us to look at two issues on which the Parish Council has been campaigning. The first is a sewage leak into Semington Brook. During periods of rain, two manholes next to the brook at the bottom of Russell Mill Lane overflow and pour raw sewage into our chalk stream. Brian has agreed to campaign with us to ensure Wessex Water fixes this issue in a timely manner, as opposed to the snail's pace of ineffective fixes over the last five years. Brian learned that the main sewerage pipe from the village runs alongside the brook in Littleton Panell until it reaches the treatment works on Spin Hill. The pipe was installed in the 1950s and is damaged by tree roots. We also suspect the capacity of the pipe needs to be improved for modern living.

We also discussed the thorny issue of traffic. This will need a regional strategic solution as village traffic will not be solved until a proper north-south trunk route is provided west of Stonehenge. Brian agreed to raise this need with the other MPs in the West to take this matter to the government.

Separately, we are working hard to reinstate our Community Speed Watch. This was suspended by the Police pending traffic surveys which have now been completed and we are in the process of working through the paperwork to restart. The surveys showed a relatively small percentage of vehicles - 15% - do more than 34 mph. In reality, this is still 500 vehicles a day that exceed the posted speed limit! Community Speed Watch is an important deterrent. We are always looking for volunteers to join the team - if you would like to help, please contact us.

Ice has returned with the arrival of winter. Don't forget that the Parish has a number of resources to help residents. For those who are unsteady on your feet we have a stock of pavement salt that you can use on your doorstep and paths. Do let us know if you would like some. We also have Gel sand bags for flooding and flood road signs. Let us know if you need any of this equipment.

Gardening Jobs for January

January may seem like a quiet month in the garden, but it's the perfect time to tackle essential tasks, especially pruning. The dormant season allows you to shape and care for your plants without risking harm, ensuring a flourishing garden come spring.

Pruning trees and shrubs: Winter is ideal for pruning deciduous trees and shrubs while their structure is easy to see. Remove dead, diseased, or crossing branches to improve airflow and

encourage healthy growth. Apple and pear trees, in particular, benefit from winter pruning to shape their framework and enhance fruit production. Never prune more than 15% of a fruit tree - if you overprune it will stress the tree into growing unproductive water shoots. Avoid pruning stone fruit trees like cherries or plums now, as they are susceptible to diseases like silver leaf in cold, damp conditions.


Tidying Roses: January is a great time to prune bush roses to prepare them for the growing season. Cut back to outward-facing buds, removing any weak or spindly stems. This will create an open shape like a vase that promotes good air circulation, reducing the risk of fungal diseases.

Cutting back Wisteria: Wisteria needs attention this month. Prune summer side shoots back to two or three buds from the main framework to control size and encourage abundant flowers.

Other tasks to tackle: While pruning is a priority, don't forget to check stored bulbs and tubers for rot, clear debris from borders, and clean, sharpen and oil tools for the year ahead. Don't forget to get your petrol mower serviced.

By focusing on these tasks, particularly careful pruning, you'll set the stage for a healthy, vibrant garden that thrives throughout the year.

Imagine you are running in a marathon, and one of the athletes decides to pick their own path. They keep to the 26 mile race standard and set their finish line in the same spot as the official one, but they pick routes with fewer hills and shorter paths. Their plan seems excellent to them, but when they cross the finish line, there will be no medal or ribbon waiting.

That seems a crazy thing to do. We can fall into this very trap when we decide the course for our life instead of running the race God intends. By submitting to His will we remain on the right path. But the moment we revert to old habits or start making decisions based on our own wisdom, we drift away from the right path. (Heb 12:1)

Whether believers run the race God's way or their own way, they will reach a finish line. That does not mean that it's the same one. No one wants to look back and realise that they didn't run the course meant for them and that they did not accomplish anything of value. Deeds done for the Lord are the only truly lasting and worthwhile ones. (1 Corinthians 3:11-15)

Thankfully, even if we veer far off course, the Holy Spirit is still present. We are reminded of the right path enabled with the power to return to the right path and persevere. We need to check our course is correct by reading scripture and praying for guidance. Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding, in all your ways submit to Him and He will make your paths straight'. (Proverbs 3:5-6)

More fundraising needed to meet shortfall

In November, Dorothy House launched its ambitious 'Bridge the Gap Appeal', a 36-hour fundraising super sprint, aimed at raising \pm 350,000 for local care. This resulted in over 3180 donations in a 36-hour window, raising an amazing \pm 370,000.

Dorothy House Hospice Care provides free palliative and end of life care to over 550,000 people in Bath & North East Somerset, and parts of Somerset and Wiltshire. With no additional funding yet offered, the National Insurance changes announced in the budget will cost Dorothy House Hospice Care an additional £422,000 per year. Rising costs over several years have meant hospices across the UK, including Dorothy House, are facing growing financial pressure.

The Hospice estimates that it is only serving 50% of the population requiring end of life care. To meet the challenges facing the community, Dorothy House continues to innovate, ensuring it is doing all it can to provide more care for more patients and families across its 800 square mile patch. The Hospice is funded partly by the NHS, but predominantly by donations, its 27 shops, and fundraising efforts. For every £1 from the government, it has to raise another £4 to make sure it can meet the growing need for its services.

'Emmanuel: God with us'

Joseph, a carpenter from Nazareth, was considering breaking off his engagement to Mary. She was pregnant. And he wasn't the father. According to Matthew's Gospel, the angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream to convince him to go through with the marriage. The heavenly visitor told the carpenter, 'do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit.' As the Lord had spoken by Isaiah the prophet, 'Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son,

and they shall call his name Emmanuel.' The name given to Jesus by ancient prophecy tells us something about his unique identity and mission.

God with us Matthew explains that Emmanuel means, 'God with us'. Christians believe that the baby boy who was born in Bethlehem and laid in a manger was God in human form. Now, that's an awesome claim. We might perhaps expect that God would do God-like stuff, like create the universe to display his wisdom, power and goodness. But would the Creator of heaven and earth stoop to enter our world as man? The New Testament insists that he did. Jesus is the Son of God, fully divine in every way. Yet he became human. He is Emmanuel, God with us as one of us.

God for us The angel of the Lord also instructed Joseph that Mary's son was to be named Jesus "for he will save his people from their sins". Jesus is the Greek version of the Hebrew name Joshua, which means 'the Lord saves'. That is the reason why God became man, to rescue us from sin and death. Christ, who was without sin, died in our place on the cross that we may be forgiven. As Paul affirms, 'God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.'

God in us Matthew concludes his Gospel by telling us that Jesus rose from the dead and appeared to his disciples. The final words of the risen Lord to his followers in Matthew's account are, "And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age.' Jesus ascended to heaven, having completed the work of salvation. He then poured out the Holy Spirit upon the church on the Day of Pentecost. Christ dwells in his people by the power of the Spirit. His presence in the lives of his followers now is the pledge of greater things to come, 'Christ in you, the hope of glory'. Jesus became Emmanuel, God with us so that those who believe in him may be with God for ever.

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
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
