My teenage daughter and I were lucky enough to get tickets for the Olympics this Summer.

On our way back to Caen for the ferry home, we visited a couple of sites from WW2. Lunch at the 'old cafe' at Pegasus Bridge (still run by the lady whose parents helped the Allies the night it was liberated), and then on to the Commonwealth War Cemetery at Hermanville, behind Sword Beach, a British D-Day landing beach.

Hermanville contains 1,003 war burials, 103 of them unidentified. After only a few minutes walking along the rows, we were taken aback when we came across the grave of a brave young man who had lived just down the road from us.

It was the only grave we saw which had the name of the village on it as well as the county. It really brought the reality of the past into our present. Looking at the poppy cross, the grave may have been visited recently but if there are any relatives reading this who would like a digital copy of the photograph, just let me know.

All change... but business as usual in our churches!

Sunday 29th September saw the final service of Reverend Marion Harrison, who has now retired from the Benefice of The Lavingtons, the Cheverells and Easterton after seven years of service here. It was a packed church at All Saints' and a wonderful send off with gifts and 'thank yous' from the congregations.



This means that we are now in a period without an Incumbent Vicar, when representatives from each of the churches work alongside each other and put together a new Parish Profile to advertise the vacancy. Whilst we believe that God will call the right person to our Benefice, we also want to share the characters of our villages and congregations and how we envision our future. We are really lucky to have our Assistant Rural Dean, Rev'd Dr Keith Brindle from St James' Devizes, to help us with this work.

We are revising our service schedules and our Lay Worship Leaders are stepping up so that our churches are well covered – especially for Advent and Christmas. There will be a Communion service on the first and third Sunday of every month at 10.30am, led by Rev'd Caroline Spindlow, Associate Priest from St John's in Devizes. The location of these will be advertised in News and Views and give an opportunity for you to visit a church in our different villages. Less formal services will be held in the villages on the second and fourth Sundays.

Our schools work continues to grow in supporting Collective Worship, and our visits to residential homes continue. This month you can remember a loved one at the All Souls' service at St Barnabas in Easterton (6pm on Friday 1st November) and each of our churches will be holding a special Remembrance Day service.

If you haven't been to one of our services before, please do come and see what they are like. From the more formal traditional Communion services to the very informal, shorter breakfast church (with newspapers and bacon butties) and welcome to worship services that are on offer, you are guaranteed a warm welcome!

Our local churches are there to walk alongside you and your families. One of the most precious things that they can offer is a unique service for those landmark times in our lives – from baptisms, weddings and wedding blessings to funerals and celebrations of a person's life. There is something very precious about having these special events in our beautiful churches in the centre of our communities and villages. We are also able to visit and pray with those that are not able to come to church.

Mothers'JN ON

The West Lavington Mothers' Union met on 9th September when we had an afternoon of meditation, led by Reverend Caroline Spindlow. She began by explaining why we do meditation - the aim is to draw us into a closer relationship with God. We were talked through the meditation by listening to the story of the healing of Blind Bartimaeus in Matthew 10:46-52. Afterwards we discussed how we were affected by stepping into the story and the emotions we experienced. It was a wonderful afternoon, and Caroline has agreed to talk us through another meditation next year. Our October meeting started with prayers for the victims of domestic abuse, for the Mothers' Union, and for peace in the world. This was followed by our annual planning meeting, which was quite successful, as we have managed to allocate speakers and events for all of 2025.

We continue to support Rise Up, the Mothers' Union campaign against domestic abuse. Together with West Lavington WI, we are collecting gift items for the Salisbury Women' Refuge and adult colouring books for Wiltshire Fear Free which are used to help victims of abuse.

PENSION CREDIT - don't stall, just call 0800 99 1234!

Pension Credit gives extra money to people on a low income who have reached pensionable age. It is also a gateway to other help from the state, such as the Winter Fuel Payment, Housing Benefit, and a Council Tax discount. Despite being fairly complex, it is ALWAYS worth checking if you are eligible for Pension Credit.

You must apply for Pension Credit by **21st December 2024** to qualify for the 2024/2025 Winter Fuel Payment.

- To qualify for Pension Credit you must:
- Live in the UK England, Scotland, Wales or Northern Ireland;
- have reached state pension age;
- have a weekly income below £218.15 if you're single, or £332.95 if you're in a couple. (The income threshold can be slightly higher if you claim a disability-related benefit such as Attendance Allowance or have caring responsibilities).

If you're in a couple, you'll BOTH need to have reached state pension age (currently 66). You don't have to be married or in a civil partnership - you're considered a couple if you live together. For couples, one partner should apply and then provide income and savings details for both partners.

You don't need to be online to apply

You can apply for Pension Credit by telephone or by post, as well as online. A friend or family member can call for you if you cannot use the telephone. Have as much information about your income and savings to hand as you can, plus your National Insurance Number, and your bank account details.

To apply by phone

Call the Pension Credit Claim line on: **0800 99 1234** Textphone: **0800 169 0133**. If you cannot hear or speak on the phone, you can also use Relay UK Dial **18001 then 0800 99 1234**. The Claim line is open Monday to Friday, 8am to 6pm. You can also use this number to ask for help and advice.

To apply by post

Ring the Claim line, and ask them to post the application form to you. Fill in the form and send it to: **Freepost, DWP Pensions Service 3.** You do not need a stamp.

I have to apologise to West Lavington for not updating you all on the way the Youth Club is successfully continuing. We were inevitably closed during Covid, and since that time have been rebuilding membership year on year, having restarted with year seven and year eight. As years pass the average age of the membership increases. We also made a decision to start a much younger group, on the grounds that they would act as a feeder for the older groups. This was particularly successful for younger brothers and sisters who could attend happily without being overawed by much older members.

Over the past two years (since Covid?) we have noticed a significant number of young people with problems of socialising and integrating with others. Firstly, we have updated our training training for staff to enable them to recognise these children, and give them skills to help. Secondly, we have obtained a special grant from the Area Board to provide one-to-one support where it is needed. The end result is that we have young people coming to the Youth Club who under many other situations would not be able to attend. This has also led to significant parental support for the Club, and parents are volunteering to help staff during sessions.

We have always taken the view that attendance at the Club is free and should be open to all regardless of circumstances, a policy promoted by George Baker when he founded the Club over 25 years ago. His legacy continues as the Club continues to provide a safe and active place for young people to meet, not just with their peers but with a number of trained staff whom they can learn to trust and respect.

Otis Tarda

After jackdaws and rooks we have crows. Crows are highly intelligent, having huge brains - their brain to body ratio is even larger than humans. They mate for life, can remember faces, and have been known to attack humans who have harmed any of their family. They hold funerals, fashion tools, such as a sharpened stick, and bend forked twigs into hooks to scoop larvae and worms from holes in wood. They cache their food and even speak in regional dialects, but sadly they prey on smaller birds, their nestlings and eggs too. They eat frogs and snakes and also snails. More in the next issue on magpies and jays.

It is rare for birds to attack humans, but recently an 86 year old pensioner was seriously injured in the French village of Verrieres near the Gorges du Tarn in Aveyron by a 9ft wingspan Griffon Vulture, one of the largest European birds of prey. The LPO, France's bird protection league, reintroduced the species and there are over 850 breeding pairs in Aveyron, producing 500 young annually. The local farmers are none



too pleased because of increasing attacks on livestock. With the introduction of White Tailed Eagles in Southern England farmers here too are on the lookout for attacks. Some readers might remember Eric Hosking, the famous bird photographer, losing an eye from a tawny owl attack in the 1950s due to getting too close to the nest.

Many of you will have read about the WWF's (World Wildlife Fund) statement recently that humans are ruining the planet due to over-population (UK's now increased to 67 million and growing, the World's nearly 9 billion) and overdeveloping and ruining the environment. Forests in South America and Central Africa are so exploited they are reaching tipping points and may never recover due to continuing destruction. In the UK the Government has recently announced special Envoys for Nature and Climate. Let us hope that they will make a significant difference to the protection of flora and fauna in the British Isles.

There is a current 'nature emergency' for butterflies of the British Isles. Species in the danger zone are: Gatekeeper (-32%), the Common Blue (-52%), the Small Tortoiseshell and Green-Veined White (both -65%). The writer saw only one Red Admiral this autumn and no Peacocks all summer. Bat numbers are also down. It's pleasing to see our garden birds in their smart new plumages after moulting - perky new tails, brighter coloured feathers and more singing to establish their territories - but there are fewer them. It's the first time we have had no resident blackbirds and others are also reporting declining birds species and numbers in their gardens. We must be a force for climate and nature, otherwise all could be lost.

It's the time of year to check bird boxes and hibernaculums (hedgehog boxes) and repair or replace as necessary. Don't forget to plant a tree for prosperity and carbon capture. Remember to check bonfires for hibernating hedgehogs and dormice before November 5th.

Navigating Care and Support

When age creeps up on us or our loved ones, we are often faced with a range of issues that requires us to find and access the relevant agency to provide the necessary support at the right time. This could start with minor adjustments to enable independence, such as grab rails, panic/smoke alarms and house security, to more complex care/nursing support. The key to all of this is knowing when to start, what to focus on, how to get it and trying to coordinate it all.

The key questions to ask are:

We know ourselves and our loved ones extremely well, but our judgement is often clouded by our own perceptions. An objective assessment by trained professionals at the right time will identify and recommend what is needed and by whom. It is better to act sooner rather than later - prevention is the key, so the more we do upfront, the longer the individual can maintain their independence in a safe environment.

Making the home safe and secure

Contact the **Wiltshire Bobby Van Trust:** They provide a free home security service and online safety service for the over 60s, and 18+ with a registered disability. They will come out and assess the home and fit such things as key safes and fire alarms.

Medical and Care Support

Contact your GP, explain the situation and if they have not yet done the referral, request such things as a physical assessment by a physiotherapist for all things relevant to movement, including any equipment to aid the individual; and an Occupational Therapist assessment for all things relevant to supporting someone in their own home, such as grab rails and ramps (they have a range of gadgets that are very effective).

Wiltshire Council's website also has a lot of information including where and how to access equipment or care support at **https://adults.wiltshire.gov.uk/**

You have access to a Care Co-ordinator within the GP practice. Book an appointment with them to talk about Access to Care in the home or via a Care/Nursing Home. They will explain everything and how to access it, including the funding rules.

More complex support

By this stage you should be well plugged in to your GP and associated agencies. They will be able to provide you with a range of options moving forward. There is a lot of support and equipment that is free to you, so do grab it when it is offered!

You are not alone in this complex and challenging agenda. If you are caring for a loved one there is support you can access through your GP or via Carer Support Wiltshire on **01380 871690** or via **https://carersupportwiltshire.co.uk**

A Message from Cllr Dominic Muns Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons

Out here in the sticks we can enjoy beautiful country walks, village pubs and a better sense of community than residents in busy towns. However, from a transport perspective we are less fortunate than residents in Trowbridge, Salisbury or Chippenham who have train stations, regular bus connections and better cycling and walking infrastructure.

At October's Full Council meeting I submitted a motion to force colleagues to acknowledge this disparity. Too often people neglect the fact that in rural areas like The Lavingtons we don't have the services we need at the end of the road, and can't rely on public transport. My motion had two further purposes; to increase the ambition for public transport and active travel improvements in rural areas AND to reject schemes that might suit those living in Salisbury or Trowbridge, but which penalise those of us living more rurally who can only get about in a car or van.

You have probably experienced ULEZ, Congestion Charge Zones and Low Traffic Neighbourhoods in certain areas of the UK. Many view them as a stealth money-making tactic (£27.50 in charges to drive into London) but in certain circumstances they have been shown to cut emissions. In other places, however, they have been proven to worsen air quality as cars are shifted off target roads and onto others, leading to increased congestion and longer idling times. The fact is that implementing ULEZ in a place like London where public transport is reliable, easily accessed and cost effective is very different from implementing it in Devizes or Salisbury where those of us living twenty minutes away struggle to reach the town centre via anything but a car.

I am passionate about improving air quality and tackling climate change and recognise that to be successful we all need to work together. Implementing restrictions on certain residents that have no choice but to use a private motor vehicle is unfair. We often talk about a 'carrot or stick' approach to behaviour change (punishing people for doing one thing or rewarding them for doing another). When it comes to residents in The Lavingtons, unfortunately, one certain group of councillors in the chamber would rather reach for a big stick to hit you with before offering you an alternative option.

My motion, which thankfully was supported by Conservative members who actually care about the day-to-day struggles of residents, will safeguard all of us from demonisation for having no choice but to drive our cars. It has NOT changed the Council's investment in air quality improvements or reduced our expansion of active travel and public transport improvements. This does not stop us from continuing to implement 20mph limits outside schools or installing air quality monitors across the county. In fact, as you will see from our upcoming Local Transport Plan, these improvements are front and centre in our plan to improve Wiltshire for everybody.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL



Our Rights Of Way (RoW) are a key part of our village. Not only do they provide routes that cross ours and connect to other villages, they are a valuable leisure amenity enjoyed by the majority of us. Whether it is walking dogs, riding horses, exploring the countryside, a family stroll or a trip to the pub, our large network of footpaths and other RoW are used a lot!

You can help keep that valuable community resource available and in good condition. If you find a section of path that needs work, please send us a message on our dedicated footpaths email **Footpaths@westlavington.org.uk** so that we can follow up with the relevant owner, or organise a work party to deal with it. If you would like to help with footpath clearance, maintenance or monitoring, or even running a litter pick, use the same email address.

We have recently been hearing from local farmers who have been very busy harvesting and preparing fields for winter crops. This work involves some very large pieces of equipment and unfortunately the operators have been encountering walkers crossing fields and horse riders riding along field edges, which causes both health and safety risks and financial impacts to the farmers. Can we please remind everyone to keep to the designated Rights of Way so that we can avoid these problems. You can check on the routes of the designated Rights of Way throughout the Parish using the Wiltshire Council Rights of Way Map on their website **https://wiltscouncil.maps.arcgis.com/apps/webappviewer/index.**

There is also a link to that map on the West Lavington Parish Council website.

Keeping to the Rights of Way is of course easier when the paths are clear of obstructions and overgrowth. The Parish Council is working with various landowners to encourage them to keep the paths on their land open, but everyone whose land borders a RoW can help, especially at this time of year. If your garden hedge borders a Right Of Way, you are responsible for cutting the RoW side and ensuring the footpath is not blocked. Over time many hedges have got thicker, thus restricting the width of the RoW. Please make sure you cut yours back!

This is the right time of year to deal with issues on Rights of Way and clearance of undergrowth, and we must try and complete all that valuable work before spring when birds start nesting.

Planning Matters: At the last Parish Council Meeting, Councillors considered two applications for works to trees and raised no objections. No new planning applications had been received at the time of going to press.





Holy Trinity had a visit from Wessex Archaeology to talk about the Digging for Erlestoke project, which builds on the excavations originally carried out at the Manor House in 1963. **Sarum class** were lucky enough to have a workshop handling artefacts found in the excavations from the Neolithic period, finding out how they were used and what they tell us about prehistoric life in this area. Wessex Archaeology has very generously gifted us an archaeologist's bag with tools and all the artefacts we studied to inspire an understanding of how humans lived in the past.

Stonehenge class had a fabulous trip to Wiltshire museum in Devizes. They spent the day learning all about houses from the past, handling artefacts and discovering lots about life in Victorian times. White Horse class were out and about in the village this week, finding out what it was like to live in Great Cheverell during Victorian times. We dressed in Victorian clothes and were taken back in time by Nellie Bowden (really Mrs Heath, all dressed up as one of her ancestors), who lived near our school in the late nineteenth century. With the help of another historical character played by Mrs Andrew, the children learnt what it was like to grow up as a Victorian child in Great Cheverell. A great big thank you to Mrs Heath and Mrs Andrew for sharing their historical knowledge in such a fun and memorable way.

Field of Poppies Ceramic Workshop: Children and staff have all been involved in the creation of their own unique ceramic poppy. These will be added to our Remembrance Field of Poppies art installation in early November.

Keeping Unity and Peace

Disunity is the sad reality for many churches today. Members can be offended by one another, each wanting to direct the church one way, while another wants to follow another agenda. In fact disunity is prevalent in the world today, in the Middle East, Russia and Ukraine and many other parts of the world, revealing destructive inhumane conflict.

But we're called to be peacemakers. Peter wrote a letter to Christians

experiencing persecution and gave instructions on how to respond to situations in the home and in the world. He wrote 'all of you be harmonious, sympathetic, loving, compassionate and humble. Do not return evil for evil or insult for insult, but give a blessing instead, for you were called for the very purpose that you would inherit a blessing'(1 Peter 3:8-9).

Christians relate to each other on a very deep level as they have a common life in Christ, filled with His Holy Spirit. Peter's letter mainly relates to relationships between believers. The word harmony means 'to be of one mind', a difficult thing to do with those who aren't surrendering to Christ. However, believers may not agree on every issue either, but if our minds are set on Christ, we can live in peace and harmony with one another as the Holy Spirit is doing the work within us to seek Him.

Even though we can't have unity with unbelievers, we must treat them with the grace that we've received. 'If possible, as far as it depends on you, be at peace with all people' (Romans 12:18). Sympathy, compassion, love, kindness and humility are more effective in sharing the truth and peace of Christ, than are rudeness, insults, anger and harshness.

We must not fear ridicule, strong criticism, or being mistreated. Our witness is magnified when we suffer for Christ's sake. These hardships allow Christ to shine through us into a dark and hostile world. 'For when I am weak then I am strong' (It is then that we depend on God for strength) (2 Corinthians 12:10).

Let everyone see in our behaviour, attitudes and word a life transformed by Christ.

Losing our virtue

Matthew Syed is one of the most insightful columnists writing today. A couple of his recent articles in The Sunday Times really made me think. In one he argued, 'All the policy in the world won't save us if we can't rediscover patience'. Easy access to money has 'taken the waiting out of wanting'. Both governments and individuals prefer to borrow to spend now, rather than save up and purchase goods more cheaply. Government debt is unsustainably high at 100% of GDP and those Klarna bills soon

mount up. We need to learn once more that patience is a priceless virtue.

In another piece Syed reflected on a key lesson from the Grenfell Tower inquiry, namely 'Today's disasters aren't caused by lack of regulation, but simple dishonesty'. Governments can pass as many new regulations as they wish, but if building contractors dishonestly subvert health and safety rules, more disasters are likely to happen. As with patience, fidelity to truth pays economic dividends. Countries where people are more likely to be honest are typically wealthier than lands where lies and corruption are the order of the day.

But as the writer's point about Grenfell shows, more State regulation isn't necessarily the answer. In fact, the idea that governments can form us into more virtuous citizens is laughable. The last lot never recovered from 'Partygate'. Sir Keir Starmer pledged to lead a 'government of service', a noble sentiment, but to many it seems more like a 'government of scroungers'. The PM and some of his senior ministers have faced a barrage of criticism for accepting hordes of freebies; from expensive clothing to pricey concert tickets.

Syed has certainly diagnosed the cause of many of our ills today, but he prescribes no cure. How may we regain our virtue? It is increasingly recognised that the 'Christian Revolution' had a transformative effect on the moral and spiritual climate of the ancient world. This was not a top-down imposition of morality by regulation, but a matter of personal regeneration. As Paul wrote: 'if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come.' In the New Testament believers are frequently urged to shun their old vices and display the virtues of truth, self-control and hard work. So, Vive la Christian Revolution!


